Throughout the dark winter months I've been anticipating the arrival of Spring with a series of paintings inspired by our walks together around Cannop Ponds - one of the Forest of Dean's many delightful recreational areas situated within a few miles of our home.



Bringing together colourful waterfowl and water's ripples and reflections, these compositions combine many of my favoured elements for oil painting. With such limited access to areas of the Forest during lockdown, I was able to look back nostalgically at photographs I had taken during the happier, more liberated times of 2019 !

New work from Stuart.

Taking a leaf out of Carmen's book I've stayed indoors and have used the opportunity to devote my time to something different from my stock-intrade pen and ink work. Portraits have always interested me and so I've switched medium to Gouache and taken up the style of 'blocked monochrome'. Employing the principle of strict light and shade composition, this method using a just a small range of shades or colour tints - shows the fundamental importance of form in producing a likeness.

To illustrate the point, the picture above shows that with some well-known faces just two shades create a recognisable image.

Just three shades and this work-in-progress study of Steve McQueen below states its identity quite well.

Four shades of grey and three tints of purple have brought Louise Brooks (dancer and silent film actress) to life, I think.

Incidentally, I've found that female portraits in this style require more shades and tints than males (there may be a message there, somewhere!)
